

Title VI Notice to the Public Sheridan County Public Transportation System (SCPTS)

Title VI Notice to Public Sheridan County Public Transportation System (SCPTS) gives public notice of its policy to assure full compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and all related statutes. Title VI requires that no person in the United States of America shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from the participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which SCPTS receives Federal financial assistance. Any person who believes that he or she has, individually, or as a member of any specific class of persons, has been excluded from participation in, been denied the benefits of, or otherwise subjected to discrimination under any Sheridan County Public Transportation System (SCPTS) service, program or activity, and believes the discrimination is based upon race, color, national origin, gender, age, economic status or limited English proficiency has the right to file a formal complaint. Complaints will be accepted in writing and may be filed with SCPTS's management at Northwest Community Partnership 270 Pine Street, Chadron, Nebraska 69337 . A signed written complaint must be submitted within 120 days of the alleged discriminatory act (or latest occurrence). Individuals may also file complaints directly with the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT), and/or the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) within the 180 day timeframe. Complaints may also be filed by calling SCPTS's management at (308) 432-3393 extension 52 or via email at [bbrixius@ncap.info](mailto:bbrixius@ncap.info). • The complaint at a minimum should include the following information: • Your name and address, and a telephone number where you may be reached during business hours; • A general description of the person(s) or class of persons injured by the alleged discriminatory act(s); • A description of the alleged discriminatory act(s) in sufficient detail to enable us to understand what occurred, when it occurred, and the basis of the alleged discrimination complaint (race, color, or national origin); • The letter must be signed and dated by the person filing the complaint or by someone authorized to do so on his or her behalf.
